ELDERBERRIES is a community garden that has been created on waste land around and to the rear of the Lenthall House Care Home off Western Avenue in Market Harborough. The aims are:

- To involve local people in growing organic fruit and vegetables for use by the care home and to give away to others.
- To provide an attractive green space for the elderly residents to sit in and chat with the volunteer gardeners some of them hardly ever have visitors.
- To provide the elderly people with contact with children a group of local nursery school children visit the garden every week to 'help' with the gardening and learn about plants and growing things.
- To provide meaningful activity and friendship for a number of people who are lonely or who are dealing with mental health problems a number of such people have joined the team of volunteers and are benefitting hugely.

The group is run on a shoestring and any money raised goes towards plants, fruit trees, tools, topsoil, benches and timber for raised beds.
